

REGISTERING FOR RWTO/OERO EVENTS

Because we have a variety of different types of activities as part of our annual program, there are several different ways to register. Keep these things in mind:

- For some events, such as luncheons where the venue asks for a guaranteed number of participants, and sometimes a payment up front, we ask you to send in your payment and a registration form to the co-ordinator of the event by the given date. You should also alert the co-ordinator of any dietary constraints you have.
- At other times, contacting the co-ordinator by e-mail or phone is sufficient. It is, however, essential that, if you must cancel for whatever reason, you do so in a timely manner when possible, so that reservations can be changed. This contact is also useful if you have any questions regarding directions, meals, etc.
- If you have signed up at a luncheon for an upcoming activity, the co-ordinator will contact you prior to the event to confirm that you still

plan to attend, and to provide any additional information she might have about it, such as travel directions. This allows you to ask any questions you have about the event.

- If you are unable to travel on your own to an activity, but would like to attend, arrangements can be made by the co-ordinator to have someone provide transportation for you. Please indicate such a need on your registration form or in a phone call/e-mail.
- If an activity is being held out of the city, car pooling is a good practice. Let the event co-ordinator know if you are interested in doing this. A central location will be established as a meeting place, and everyone can meet together, fill up a few cars to save gas and emissions, and enjoy the company of other members on the drive to your destination.
- Remember that if you misplace your newsletter, it is always available on the RWTO web site.

2015 COMMUNITY OUTREACH PROJECT

November 30 was the culmination of this Branch project in which our members were invited to submit proposals of programs for women and children who they felt should receive our donations of \$300 each. Displays were set up to demonstrate the work done by the successful groups, and cheques were presented to our members who put their names forth:

- The Well - All Saints Anglican Church - to provide necessities for women and children

WHY BE A MEMBER OF RWTO/OERO?

The Retired Women Teachers of Ontario (RWTO/OERO) is an organization that contributes to several aspects of women teachers' lives after they retire from the responsibilities of a teaching career. It provides:

- *a strong communication network and opportunities for social interaction among retired women teachers at both the local and provincial levels.*
- *interesting and challenging programs for intellectual stimulation, information about issues of particular interest to retired women teachers and opportunities for cultural enrichment.*
- *support for colleagues especially in times of illness, loneliness, stress and sorrow.**

In April 1956, women teachers joined together to form a professional organization to provide fellowship, friendship, communication and support to retired colleagues. RWTO/OERO was initially formed as the Ontario Association of Superannuated Women Teachers (OASWT) by a small group of retired teachers in Toronto. In 1967, they became successful advocates of pension reform. Later, RWTO/OERO interests gave rise to the formation of the RTO. As RWTO/OERO and the RTO meet different needs, many retired women teachers elect to belong to both organizations. Currently there are about 5,400 RWTO/OERO members organized into 52 local branches across the province.

Benefits of belonging to a RWTO/OERO branch include opportunities to engage in diverse activities such as:

- luncheons with informative speakers or entertainers
- special interest groups such as book and movie clubs, walking groups, craft groups, and more
- excursions to local places of interest including concerts, theatre, art exhibitions and seasonal opportunities

In addition to supporting its members, RWTO/OERO is *socially conscious and works to establish a visible,*

*outward-looking presence among teachers in particular and the public in general to improve the lives of all women and children.** This gives members the opportunity to continue to use their leadership, creative and communication skills within the organization and to support a variety of community outreach programs.

A significant benefit of becoming a member of RWTO/OERO is the Insurance Plan that provides support to women teachers and their spouses at a very reasonable rate. This plan is different than most other health insurance plans in the type of benefits that are covered. The three programs offered are Hospital and Home Care, Personal Accidental Death & Dismemberment Insurance, and Travel Insurance.

We welcome retired elementary, secondary, college or university women teachers who taught in any part of the world to become members. We are a caring and sharing group of women with varied careers, experiences and stories that prompt lots of laughter about the "good old days". The membership fee for the Ottawa-Carleton Branch is \$48 per year, September to August. \$40 is a provincial fee, and \$8.00 local. 25% of the provincial fee is returned to the branch to help cover administration and program costs.

Check out the "Help Wanted" item in this newsletter to see how you can help our membership grow.

Did you know that if we increase our membership substantially we may be entitled to a monetary award from RWTO/OERO? Nine Branches each year receive a Barbara Bain Membership Award of \$300, \$200, or \$100 to help with their yearly expenses. Let's see if we can be one of the nine next year!

HELP WANTED!

Over the last few years, privacy policies have prevented teacher affiliates and school boards from providing the names of teachers planning to retire to outside parties. It has been difficult to obtain these names to provide information about RWTO/OERO and invite them to become members. There are also many who have been missed in recruitment activities in recent years. We think you can help to develop a list which can be used to extend invitations to join us. The names, with contact information, would be used only for this purpose.

- Do you know a teacher who is still working? Do you have a family member who is still teaching? If so, would you be willing to inquire if they would ask prospective women retirees in their schools for permission to provide their names to us so that we can send promotional materials and an invitation to join us?
- Do you have a relative or neighbour who has been retired for awhile but has not joined RWTO/OERO? Have you met retired women teachers in other

clubs or groups which you have joined who are not members? Would you be willing to ask them if we can send them promotional materials about RWTO/OERO?

- Do you know someone, a neighbour or contact, who has just relocated to Ottawa from somewhere else? Would you be willing to offer her a way to meet women with a similar background and, perhaps, common interests by joining RWTO/OERO?

Just think what a list of potential members we could provide to our Membership Convenor, Sheila McKay to achieve our goal of increasing our membership number if we all pitch in to help!! We would need contact information including name, address, phone and e-mail address, along with the date when they will be retiring or did retire. RWTO/OERO - 60 YEARS AND GOING STRONG!

Yes, 2016 marks the 60th Anniversary of the beginning of our organization, and we plan to celebrate in style by "Puttin' on the Glitz" at a Diamond Jubilee Celebration in April.



We know that this must be a very important occasion... a quick Internet search by Google, that go-to source for all information, produced the following results:

- "Diamond Anniversary" - 53,300,000 hits
- "Diamond Jubilee" - 9,200,000 hits

Do you think RWTO/OERO's 60th will show up as one of those hits?

RWTO/OERO has been important in the lives of retired women teachers in Ontario in many ways over the decades since it was started by a group of women in Scarborough. On April 3, 1956 it was formally established to protest the low pensions paid to women retirees. It has developed into a 5,400+ member organization that cares for the interests and well-being of retired women teachers, and provides a way for retired women teachers to come together for social interaction, stimulating programs, emotional support and most of all, friendship. The Diefenbunker is a four-story, 300-room, 100,000 square foot underground bunker, and was meant to house 535 Canadian government officials and military

officers in the event of a nuclear war. Shrouded in mystery, the Diefenbunker, nicknamed after then Prime Minister John Diefenbaker, was designed and built in secrecy during the crest of Cold War fear, between 1959 and 1961. The one-hour guided tour will unlock some of the mystery for us.



The Museum is wheelchair accessible and has manual wheelchairs to loan to visitors on a first come, first served basis. An elevator is available for visitors who are not able to use the stairs.
