Insurance Matters

Here we are; it's Christmas once again! That magical time of year that brings friends and family close to celebrate the season. We decorate our homes, bake enticing goodies, and cook up a frenzy in anticipation of numerous meals and gatherings. It's a time of memories, a time to laugh and for some, a time of sadness, as they recall those who have passed. For those who've lost a loved one, we reach out in friendship and understanding offering comfort, as best we can. For many, we're thankful we enjoy sufficiently good health to be able to remain in our own homes for as long as we can.

I'm reminded of the reason why the Hospital & Home Care Plan came to be. In 1974 the Association, then known as OASWT, introduced this plan to help members maintain their independence and age in place for as long as possible. At that time Norma Hackett, Insurance Convenor from Windsor, explained the need for a post-hospital home care plan. She said that many retired women teachers live alone by choice, or because they outlive their husbands. She explained that retired women teachers are an independent breed and health care costs jeopardize that independence. She pointed out that next to Extended Health Care insurance under a Group Benefit plan, a post-hospital home care plan is probably the most important personal protection retired women can have, providing help when we are most vulnerable. The Hospital & Home Care Plan fills much of that need.

We're fortunate to live in a country where we have good, basic health care provided under the various Provincial Insurance plans. Yet, as good as it is, our recent experience with COVID-19 has exposed many gaps and failures within the health care system. Both the Federal and Provincial governments have known for many years of the approaching "Grey Tsunami" of baby boomers reaching retirement age and with that, the strain that would be placed upon the health care system. It is for this reason that the Ontario government began to focus on providing supports to Ontarians to recover at home. Supports provided by the Local Health Integration Networks (LHINs), such as Nurses for wound care and medication administration, Personal Support Workers to assist with bathing and dressing and Physiotherapists, while we're recovering from illness or surgeries. Unfortunately, that care is limited in duration and sometimes unavailable entirely due to staffing issues or distance.

This is what makes the Hospital & Home Care Plan so important to our members. It is filling some of these gaps with benefits, such as Home Nursing and the Convalescent Benefit. It provides for aids, such as walkers, wheelchairs, ergonomic walking poles and bath seats. And it can be used to extend other coverage, such as that provided by RTO or OTIP through the Coordination of Benefits provision, so benefits can be claimed under both plans. We invite you to investigate the many benefits provided under this plan, by visiting the RWTO website at www. rwto.org/membership/insurance-plan/ where you can view the brochure. If you can't visit the website, please ask your branch Insurance Convenor for a brochure at your next meeting.

And, finally, just a reminder...when submitting claims under the Hospital & Home Care Plan the Authorization section must be signed. We've had a number of claims recently declined because the form was submitted unsigned by the insured person.

Issues and Concerns

Aging In Place: Safeguarding Our Health

I like to think of myself as a healthy senior on the cusp of her 7th decade. I am grateful and blessed for my ability to live an active lifestyle and any aches and pains are usually temporary...until this summer. Plantar fasciitis has sidelined me from my 5K daily walks and sciatica has made extended sitting uncomfortable. In the greater scheme of things, I still have all of my original body parts (too much information I know) and have an energetic approach to my daily routines and activities. However risk factors for my age group, such as cardiovascular disease, osteoporosis, heart disease, or high blood pressure may soon start to have more of an impact.

The risk of developing chronic diseases and having multiple chronic conditions increases with age. Four behavioral risk factors are tobacco use, harmful use of alcohol, unhealthy diet and physical inactivity. Other risk factors, such as age, biological sex, family history and ethnic ancestry may increase the risk of developing chronic diseases.

Certain chronic diseases are more common among women while others are more common among men. Compared to men, women were about:

- 4.2 times more likely to be living with diagnosed osteoporosis;
- 1.9 times more likely to be living with diagnosed rheumatoid arthritis;
- 1.6 times more likely to use health services for mood and anxiety disorders;
- 1.5 times more likely to be living with diagnosed dementia (including Alzheimer's disease) and asthma; and
- 1.4 times more likely to be living with diagnosed osteoarthritis.

Adapting and maintaining a healthy lifestyle is important to prevent and manage chronic diseases. Exercise regularly; biking, walking, swimming, or low impact aerobics. Engage in moderate intensity exercise for about 20 to 30 minutes a day to reach the recommended total. Strengthen your muscles by lifting weights or doing yoga. Having a healthy, balanced diet rich in fruits, vegetables, and lean

meats while limiting your consumption of sugary and fatty foods, which can trigger inflammation in the body and lower your immune system, are important factors to sustain your healthy lifestyle.

"Although the prevalence of most chronic diseases and conditions increases with age, many can be prevented, delayed or mitigated through the development of age-friendly, safe and socially supportive environments, reducing health inequities faced by vulnerable seniors, supporting healthy behaviours and choices and focusing on effective health promotion and disease prevention activities."

Aging and chronic diseases: A profile of Canadian seniors

Think about your state of health as it is now. What can you do now to help ensure a healthy future? Here is a checklist to help you tweak any areas that need more focus:

My health:

- I am physically active and do a variety of physical activities that I enjoy.
- I eat seven or more servings of fruit and vegetables in a day.
- I have a healthy body weight that has remained the same for the past six months.
- I schedule regular appointments for physical, vision, dental and hearing check-ups.
- I know what screening tests are recommended for my age and discuss these with my doctor.
- I do not smoke or I have a plan to quit in the future.
- If I drink alcohol, I stay below the limits suggested for adults my age.
- I avoid alcohol when taking medication, or check with a doctor or pharmacist first.
- I generally experience good mental health. I am aware of the signs and symptoms of depression/ anxiety and if they continue, I will take steps to address them.
- I keep my mind active through a variety of interests and hobbies, such as reading.



Issues and Concerns - Continued

I know how to keep my bones healthy and strong, and have discussed this with my doctor or other health care professional.

I have talked with my doctor about my pre-existing medical condition and what services and supports I may need as I age.

I am aware of my family's medical history and have talked with my doctor about what I can do now to maintain my health and how my health care needs may change as I age.

I am aware of electronic tools, such as medication

reminders and health management systems that will allow me to remain healthy.

I have written down my wishes for care in the event I become incapable of giving my consent.



RWTO/OERO History

Facts From "Uncommon Women" by Lenora M Beech

The first Newsletter in 1957 was a one-page letter from the President, mailed to all members. In 1968 the Newsletter expanded to two pages and in 1972 the Executive decided to send it out by mail 4 times a year September, November, March, and May. In 1984 Dorothy Montgomery had the Newsletter printed externally and hired a crew to sort and bundle it before mailing. The total costs in 1985-1986 was \$4135.00 for printing and \$3,172.50 for postage.

In 2004 the Executive Secretary-Treasurer's duties were revised, and the Newsletter responsibility was assigned to the Communication Convenor who also took on the responsibility of the website.

The Newsletter varied in size between 8 and 12 pages depending on the content 'Connections', the RWTO/OERO newsletter is now produced 3 times a year September, December, and March. Back issues can be read on the RWTO/OERO website.

- In 1991 the Voting Card was introduced at the AGM.
- In 1993 additional voting delegates were introduced on a sliding scale. For each additional 50 members in a branch, an additional Delegate could attend the AGM at the delegates expense.
- In 1999 the Organization changed it name to RWTO/OERO from OASWT.
- In 2001 876 new members joined the organization.

From "Chalk, Challenge and Change" 2006, a RWTO/OERO 50th Anniversary Project

"My first job interview in 1937 was rather unusual. A friend of mine, who was a French high school teacher, had a car...a rare thing back then. She lent me her car to go to Dundalk to get a job. The local farmers who were on the board made the decisions and the person who interviewed was working in the field, so I had to get out and go over into the field and have the interview there. He hired me on the spot."

Katherine (Griffiths) Dwyer, Windsor "Back then, one of the "joys" of teaching was the fact that a lot of teachers, especially those in rural schools had to board in someone's house.
