Where did the Easter Bunny tradition come from?



According to some sources, the Easter bunny first arrived in America in the 1700s with German immigrants who settled in Pennsylvania and transported their tradition of an egg-laying hare called "Osterhase" or "Oschter Haws." Their children made nests in which this creature could lay its coloured eggs. Eventually, the custom spread across the United States and the fabled rabbit's Easter morning deliveries expanded to include chocolate and other

types of candy and gifts, while decorated baskets replaced nests. Additionally, children often left out carrots for the bunny in case he got hungry from all his hopping.

As with all cycles, RWTO/OERO continues on its annual journey. The RWTO/OERO 68th Convention and Annual General Meeting will be held from Tuesday, June 4, 2024 to Wednesday, June 5, 2024. This will be a virtual meeting this year held via the Zoom platform. Events will include entertainment, workshops, the annual general meeting covering the business of the organization, in memoriam, over 90s recognition and an awards ceremony. Our very own Laurie James will be singing with a virtual choir at this event. Well done Laurie!

Part of the annual general meeting will be the consideration of resolutions. You may recall last year that we proposed a resolution that would broaden the membership to include women who work in educational roles beyond teachers. There are several resolutions coming forth this year that would add to those which were approved last year. These include retired women educational speech and language pathologists, retired women educational audiologists, retired women social workers, retired women office support staff. Delegates at the annual general meeting will vote on these

resolutions and the possible inclusion of these groups in our membership.

A further resolution being proposed is to change RWTO's name from Retired Women Teachers' of Ontario/Organisation des enseignantes retraitées de l'Ontario to Retired Women Educators of Ontario/Organisation des enseignantes retraitées de l'Ontario. The rationale states that this would better reflect who we are and who we are becoming rather than who we were. Again, this resolution will be voted upon at the June meeting.

You may all remember that we will have a fee adjustment for the 2024 – 2025 year. At the RWTO/OERO Convention and AGM last year a change in the fee structure was approved. The regular membership fee will be increased from \$40.00 to \$50.00. Our Owen Sound and Area fee is \$10.00. This means that the total fee per member in our Branch will be \$60.00 per member. RWTO/OERO will refund us \$15.00. That amount plus the \$10.00 per member local fee will be what we use to fund our budget for the 2024 – 2025 year. The budget will be presented at our May 29th meeting.

I look forward to seeing you all at our March 27

meeting. We have a great presentation to look forward to, and great social time to share.

On April 3, 1918, a room at the University of Toronto overflowed with women teachers. They came from Toronto, Hamilton, North Bay, Port Arthur, Prescott, Ottawa, Chatham and Galt, to form a professional organization unique in Canada and perhaps in the world, the Federation of Women Teachers' Associations of Ontario.



One proposed objective of the Federation was "to promote the professional and financial status of women teachers". It passed only after fears were expressed about including "financial status". What would the public think of them?

A St. Thomas teacher, Bertha Adkins, read a paper which has a modern ring: "Why are Women with the same Training and Qualifications as Men Relegated to the Less Remunerative Positions?" Their other great concern was the minimum salary; in 1919 their objective was set at \$650.00

A fee was established: ten cents per year per member.

After one year, the Federation's membership was 4,236 (of 11,359 women teachers in Ontario) and their income was \$369.96.

Sixty years later, a Federation of over 33,000 women teachers with an annual income close to six million dollars, celebrates the achievements of those brave, far-sighted women of so long ago.
