I retired in 2010 and have been the Insurance Convenor for the Peterborough Branch of RWTO since 2017. Whenever there is an update to our RWTO insurance information, it is my job to get the word out to our RWTO Peterborough Branch membership. You do not have to be a fount of knowledge to do this job. It just involves providing support or directing members to get answers to their questions by calling the toll-free number (1-877-222-7340) or sending an email

(am_info@manulife.ca). There have been many exciting changes to our RWTO Insurance during my time as convenor including the recent individualized benefits cards for RWTO Insurance members and the capability to fill out and submit claim forms online. A few years ago, our Peterborough Branch suggested to Manulife that our RWTO Insurance provide coverage for Musician Earplugs (Noise Reduction Earplugs) and Nordic Walking Poles when recommended by a physician, and both were approved. As well our branch suggested that transportation by a volunteer driver for the Canadian Cancer Society be covered and that also was approved to a max. of \$100.00. If you have a suggestion that might improve our RWTO Insurance, please let me know. One thing that has not changed is the price of coverage: RWTO Members in good standing pay only \$14.49/mo. and a Spouse pays \$15.57/mo. 

"Centennial Highlights"

"To celebrate a century of progress of the City of Peterborough, 1850 – 1950"

The "pageant", "Centennial Heights" was presented by the Peterborough Normal School during Education Week, "as a feature of Education Week March Fifth to Eleventh, Nineteen Hundred and Fifty". "Every member of the student body was able to participate in at least one phase of its preparation and production. Each teacher-in-training has had some share in the work of composing the script, acting, singing, dancing, painting scenery, playing accompanists, arranging lighting and preparing stage properties. Thus, each student has had experience in that type of creative corporate activity which may be adapted to the needs of the school or community in which he or she will serve in the years ahead"

Four teachers Join Quarter Century Club

Four teachers were honoured for 25 years' service in Peterborough County, at a dinner held at the Empress Hotel, by the Peterborough County Board of Education, Thursday. Shown here with the Board Chairman, William Lech, are teachers Cora Bailey (rear), Hilda Sweet (left), Eleanor Carroll and Gladys Hamilton. They were presented with watches in recognition of their years of service. (Empress Hotel is now Empress Retirement Home)

The Board was formed three years ago. Several Boards amalgamated and the years of service were all counted.

Miss Bailey started teaching in Toronto in 1928. She later taught in Durham County and the city of Oshawa, before coming to Peterborough in 1946, where she specialized in teaching slow learners. Also, she was principal of Parkhill School for 13 years, switching to primary supervision and consultant work in 1963, her

present field. Miss Bailey is a former president of the Federation of Women Teachers Association of Ontario. (Parkhill School on Wolsely St., now apartments)

Miss Carroll started with the Peterborough City Board of Education in 1946 and at present is a kindergarten teacher at Confederation Elementary School. She has worked here most of her career. (Confederation is now St. Johns School)

Mrs. Sweet came to Peterborough from the Toronto area. Her first school here was Queen Mary. Since 1969, she has been principal of Cameron Street School.

Mrs. Hamilton first taught in the Marmora area 29 years ago. After a year in Parry Sound, she returned to this area and joined the staff of the Havelock School, where she is still teaching.

Did you know?

Normal School

The term "Normal School" has bemused me ever since I arrived in Canada, in 1969.

Finally, I turned to Wikipedia for information.

A NORMAL SCHOOL is an institution created to train teachers by educating them in the *norms* of pedagogy and curriculum. Normal schools in the Unites States, Canada and Argentina trained teachers for primary school while in continental Europe, the equivalent colleges educated teachers for primary, secondary and tertiary schools.

In 1685, St Jean-Baptiste de La Salle, founded of the *Institute of the Brothers of the Christian Schools*, in Reims, France. "Norms" included historical behavioral norms of the time, as well as norms that reinforced targeted societal values, ideologies and dominant narrative in the form of curriculum.

The first public normal school in the US was founded in Concord, Vermont in 1823.

The Ontario Normal School system came into being in Toronto in 1847 by the education reformer Egerton Ryerson.

The Peterborough Normal School was officially opened in 1908 and operated until the late 1960s. Submitted by Ann Siddell
