TEACHING HISTORY OF ELIZABETH GRAHAM

After graduation from OSCVI in 1943, there was a shortage of teachers due to the war and mom decided to pursue the same career path as her mother, aunt and others in her family. Due to the shortage, the government had set up a program where qualified high school graduates could obtain their teaching degree by enrolling in a summer course. Mom took them up on the offer and in 2 months became a certified teacher despite her youth and inexperience. She found herself soon in front of a class of 8 grades at SS #10 Keppel (Kemble) in a quaint brick one room schoolhouse. Brand new to the job, it must have been guite a challenge to teach approximately 30 students from grade 1 right through to entrance. Another interesting thing was that students could repeat a grade for multiple years so she was tasked with teaching several students who were her own age. Discipline was a challenge and soon the classroom got out of the control of this young teacher. After the first few weeks of this, mom, in exasperation, shouted QUIET and banged her pointer loudly on a desk. To her horror and that of the children, the pointer split in two! One piece sprung high into the air as if in slow motion, reached its peak and clattered down on the floor. A shocked mom still holding the broken piece of the pointer faced her now equally shocked but now, more importantly, silent class. Message received! This little lady meant business! She had no problem with discipline thereafter. Her sea legs now firmly under her, mom began her voyage of 8 years at Kemble, taking one class straight through from grade 1 to 8.

A former pupil described mom as not only a teacher but a mother figure to her. She told a story of kind things she had done for her. She also stated that her Christmas concerts were the best with always a full house at Kemble Hall.

At this time, mom lived in Southampton as her parents had moved to a farm which is now the Saugeen Golf Course. She

bought a 1926 Essex that she named Napoleon which she drove weekly to Kemble and boarded with families before returning home each weekend.

Mom retired from teaching after 8 years at Kemble in order to raise her family. When her twins got older, she was persuaded by Oliver West, the head of the school board, to return to supply teaching. Eventually she consented to resume her career as a grade 5-6 teacher at Zion Public School. Schools were amalgamated and she now had the easier experience of focusing on just 2 grades in a one room school house. As the only employee of the school, it amused her when correspondence referred to her as Principal Graham. When further amalgamation closed Zion in 1970, mom continued her career at Hillcrest School in Owen Sound, specifically in the primary and junior grades. She also took additional qualification courses at the University of Western Ontario to add to her earlier 2 month teaching degree. A former Hillcrest pupil described her as the cement uniting him with other friends in the class. She was strict but also extremely dedicated to her profession – often staying up late into the night preparing lessons and marking work. She

also knew how to have fun and hosted many students at her farm. Mom retired from teaching in 1981 but found new passions attending Retired Teacher's meetings and the Kemble Women's Institute where she was a life time member. Nora Jones died July 28, 2023. She will be missed.





Important reminders for you!

I hope everyone had a relaxing and healthy summer.

A few reminders regarding RWTO insurance.

*It is important to pay the Branch Membership fee in September to ensure continuing coverage in the RWTO Hospital and Home Care Insurance Plan.

*Reminder that the Prior Authorization Form is required to make use of the Home Nursing Benefit. Prior authorization is not required for Hearing Aids, Special Equipment, Mobility or Assistive Devices. If a member urgently requires Home Nursing, verbal approval can be obtained by calling Manulife at 1-800-222-7340



*If you have coverage under another plan, such as RTOERO or OTIP, the member would first submit the claim to that plan. When the claim is paid by the primary insurer, then submit the Claim Summary that shows the amount paid by the primary provider to Manulife Hospital and Home Care plan. The RWTO/OERO plan would then pay any outstanding amount to the benefit maximum. In the example of Physiotherapy coverage, the member would have an additional \$200 available.
