#### **AGM/CONVENTION 2023 – KINGSTON**



NB – This article contains general information about the AGM/Convention. Please refer to the March 2023 Connections for specific wording of the Resolutions presented.

RWTO/OERO made history during the AGM at Convention 2023 in Kingston! After 2 surveys over 10 years and numerous discussions with the Branches, Resolutions finally came to this event for a vote. Resolutions #1, #2 and #4 were carried by 66% of the attending delegates! Our membership has now been extended to include Educational Assistants, Early Childhood Educators and Child/Youth Workers. These professionals are recognized for their contributions to the classroom environment. Resolution #11, which was also carried, guarantees that they will be offered all of the benefits as a member of our organization. Resolutions #3 and #5 offered to include Retired Women Speech & Language Pathologists and Retired Women Social Workers, however these resolutions did not carry. There was also an amendment to #3 to include Audiologists and Vision Specialists. Again, that did not carry. Despite the extension, delegates did agree that the name of the organization should remain the same. Thus, Resolution #7 was carried. Resolution #6 was ruled out of order as its content had been taken care of previously. Resolutions #8, #9 and #12 were now not needed because of previous wording. Resolution #10 was withdrawn by the movers. Resolutions #13 and #14 dealt with changing the number of delegates that a Branch could send to an AGM/Convention and the related costs. There was so much debate about this issue that a motion was made from the floor to send it to an Ad Hoc Committee for research. Their findings are to be presented at the 2024 AGM. Resolution #15 was now not needed since the previous 2 resolutions were being sent to the Ad Hoc Committee. The Marketing Committee was established as an

Ad Hoc Committee 2 years ago. It was now time to make it a Standing Committee of the Provincial Board. So Resolution #16 was carried on that issue. They will continue their rebranding of our organization throughout Ontario. Resolutions 17 - 20 all dealt with clarification of the wording in the Constitution. They were all carried. At this time, one of the delegates suggested that the phrase "Housekeeping Items" be removed from our conversations and be replaced with "Administrative Editing". The rationale was the outdated wording referred to a woman's status in the 1950s, but does not pertain to today's society. All delegates agreed. Even though the delegates had just dealt with 20 resolutions and their amendments, one more motion came to the floor—to increase the Annual Provincial Membership fee to \$50/year beginning in 2024. This motion passed. This was presented in an effort to prevent deficit budgets moving forward. There has not been a fee increase since 2011.

# So what does all this mean for the Windsor-Essex Branch?

First of all, we can now welcome EAs, ECEs and CYWs to become members and attend our events. Most of us have worked with some fabulous women who were part of an effective classroom teaching experience. Why not invite them to become members? They will enjoy all the benefits and events that we now experience. These new members could also provide other perspectives which will be useful in our future planning. Secondly, your executive will be looking at the issue of raising annual fees starting April of 2024. Currently, our dues are \$50 with \$40 going to Provincial and \$10 staying here to help with luncheon and social activity costs. We may consider raising the fee to \$60 with \$50 going to Provincial and \$10 staying here. Starting this year, we also receive a rebate from Provincial of \$12/member. Please let your executive know your thoughts about this issue.

A huge thank-you goes out to our Parliamentarian, Jane Cartier! She definitely used her Bourinot Rules of Order to keep us on track. The first day of the AGM had moments of confusion, especially when a delegate asked for a secret ballot on all voting and then later in the morning when delegates left early to ensure they were on time for their excursions. Those 2 events cost us some time in getting through the business portion. However, on Thursday morning, the secret ballot voting was rescinded and Jane quickly got our focus back to the task at hand.

Another huge thank you goes out to our Executive Secretary-Treasurer, Linda Huffman! In her 3 years on the job, she has learned a lot and used her administrative skills efficiently. She has certainly helped many a Branch treasurer with friendly advice on the phone. Linda presented the financial information clearly and succinctly to the delegates.

Not all of our time was spent on Business however. Our delegation arrived on Monday so we had some time to explore downtown Kingston. Unfortunately the fires in the area were creating some smoke which made for some interesting scents in the air. Tuesday afternoon, there were workshops on the following topics: RW Insurance Program, Helping Our Branches Thrive, Long Term Care and Zumba Gold. On Tuesday evening, we enjoyed a cruise on the Island Queen. The Hospitality Room and Silent Auctin rounded out the days. Wednesday afternoon was reserved for pre-arranged tours of the Kingston area and Wednesday evening was the Awards Banquet. Thursday morning, we viewed the Memorial Service and at Lunch, we celebrated our Mother and Daughter duos of retired teachers.

Our Branch was represented well by our President, Pat Wales, 1st Vice President, Gina Marcon, Newsletter Editor, Diane Fotopoulos, Issues and Concerns Convenor, Janice Murphy and myself. We enjoyed a pleasant and relaxing trip on the VIA Rail train from Windsor to Kingston and back. And we visited with friends that we haven't seen since the pandemic started – lots of Caring and Sharing!

In 1974, Irma graduated with a BA from the University of Windsor, after taking many summer, winter and evening courses.

Irma retired in 1990 and during retirement, Irma has spent time looking after grandchildren, volunteering at Thrift on Mill (then the Et Cetera Shoppe) in Leamington, and involving herself in church/community activities.

# Manulife

As your Branch Convenor I do not know who carries RWTO/OERO Insurance. Due to confidentiality, I cannot ask nor do I keep a list. If you have an accident or fall ill, I want to be sure that you are accessing the benefits available so I may ask, "IF you do carry RWTO/OERO Insurance through Manulife there are some benefits available to you". This will free you up to say, "I don't have it," or "I do have it, what can I claim?"

If a member passes or moves into long term care I may ask a family member IF she carried RWTO/OERO Insurance through Manulife and if so, it needs to be cancelled, especially if it was deducted from her bank account. This will give the family member a chance to check on it.

#### **Issues and Concerns**



Smart technologies assist us in being informed and prepared for changes we may face and allow us to age well with a positive focus. Contained are some helpful "smart tech" ideas that you may already have installed in your residence and some new ones that may offer you new options.

You may find some of these products make you feel more comfortable and secure by supporting daily activities like ordering food, deliveries and connecting you with family and friends. There are apps for everything including help with special needs.

- 1. It is suggested a smartphone or a tablet is essential.
- 2. Camera-Equipped Doorbell: You see and communicate with the person on the other side of the door on your smartphone or tablet while you stay inside.
- 3. Biometric locks that open doors using fingerprints eliminating key searching and fumbles.
- 4. Smoke & Carbon Monoxide alarms allow you to have an alert sent to your family or contact person when your alarm goes off.

- 5. Smart Outside Lighting System Lights go on to alert you to outside movement and can be viewed inside on a smartphone/tablet.
- 6. Smart Inside Lighting System- This smart option includes switches, dimmers and LED bulbs. You can have lights that turn on when triggered by movement; lights scheduled to turn on/off on a schedule all controlled by your smartphone.
- 7. Voice-Enabled Smart Home System offers a range of tasks that control temperature, order groceries, turn on lights or music and even answer the phone.
- 8. Faucet and Shower Controls Some companies are now offering voice-activated services. Your voice turns the water on/off & controls the temperature. Some companies control settings by voice, app, and a wall-mounted controller.
