FROM THE TREASURER COST OF LUNCHEONS

We all know from weekly grocery shopping how much food prices keep rising. Because of this and other costs, we need to raise the cost of the luncheons.

After meeting with the chefs at Tam Heather, here is the breakdown of costs.

Cost of food

13% HST

15% gratuity (servers)

\$1.00 per person – new charge by the City of Toronto RTO Charges \$52.00 for their luncheons. Catholic Women pay \$57.00.

We are going to have to charge \$43.00 to cover all costs. When you write your cheque for Luncheons, make sure you have put in the new price.


FROM THE ARCHIVES

Memories



When my kids were teens, Santa still brought the presents. However, they would snoop. So, I started hiding them where they would NEVER find them, under all the junk piled at the bottom of their closets. Worked like a charm!

We lived out in the country so my mom would order our Christmas from the Sears catalog. Of course, when we first got the catalog, I would look at it for hours and circle all the toys I wanted Santa to bring me. I was 9 years old and I snooped at her order. I was getting pajamas, house shoes and a Bible. What?? No toys??? This can't be right!! Sure enough it was and between acting surprised at the 3 gifts and upset because there were no toys, I never snooped again! We had little money, and my mom didn't like Christmas because of that reason. I look back on that Christmas now thankful I got anything.

Our Church is about 6 blocks from our house, and we walked to attend midnight mass on Christmas Eve, we were not afraid of shootings or hit & runs, the neighborhood was very quiet & peaceful back in the 50s, Not anymore

I did an "all toy Christmas" one year, even for the adults. It was the most fun I had Christmas shopping. I gave my mom paper dolls like she played with as a child. My dad got an old-fashioned metal billiards toy that was mechanical. My brother-in-law got a football, for tailgating at Lions games. My sisters got scrabble and an easy bake oven. My nephews got a 3d puzzle and a projector that cast constellations on the ceiling and my niece got a Raggedy Ann doll. It was so much more fun than shopping for socks and sweaters!

When my husband and I bought our first house 35 years ago, there was a box of these old ornaments in the storage shed. There were at least two dozen of these baskets in various colors. Most of them have fallen victim to multiple cross-country moves, two cats and one natural disaster. This one basket and a few hand-blown balls remain. They still go on my tree every year (up high). I just love them and imagining all the Christmases they must have seen before they became mine.

HERE ARE A FEW SCAMS TO WATCH OUT FOR:

The grandparent scam.

Fraudsters are posing as concerned family members or friends, often calling or emailing with a distressing story. They may claim to be a grandchild in trouble and urgently need financial assistance. **Remember:**

- Consult with other family members before taking any action.
- Do not share sensitive information over the phone or via email.

The Two-Step verification scam

Fraudsters are pretending to represent your financial institution and employ manipulative tactics to trick you into revealing your Two-Step Verification code. This code could be used to access your account or approve unauthorized transactions. **Remember:**

- Banks will never contact you to ask for your codes, passwords or PINs.
- Never share your codes, passwords, PINs, SIN or other sensitive data with anyone, especially if you did not initiate the contact.

Fake website scam

Scammers create convincing replicas of banking websites to steal your login credentials and personal information. **Remember:**

- Verify the website's name, URL, and look for security indicators (https and padlock icon) before clicking.
- When in doubt, visit your bank's official website and click on the "Sign In" button from the home page.

Banks are committed to safeguarding your accounts and have robust security measures to protect against fraud. However, your active role remains vital. Stay vigilant, ask questions, and monitor your account regularly. Should you notice any suspicious communication or activity on your account, please contact your bank.
