WHY ARE THERE SO MANY DAFFODILS AT THE CANCER SOCIETY



As the daffodil is the first flower to grow in spring, it has been a symbol of hope for years. Cancer societies and charities first began using the flower in the 1950s, and many other organizations followed suit. Seventy years later, they're still around.

Nowadays, it is celebrated all over the world, but Daffodil Day initially started in Canada. The event was organized by the Canadian Cancer Society in 1957, and it was soon adopted by other countries. In the 1970s, the American Cancer Society launched their own Daffodil Day campaign. Australia joined in on the Daffodil Day celebrations in 1986, swiftly followed by Ireland in 1988. There are many more countries around the world that celebrate Daffodil Day. Often the celebrations are scheduled so that they happen at the same time as the first bloom of the daffodils in each country.
