Good News: Provincial has decided to hold the AGM and Convention virtually this year so we will be saving some money. This savings will be used to subsidize the cost of our luncheons.

Bad News: Attendance at the luncheons is still down and is far below average. We're not quite sure why more people are not attending. The meals have been excellent, the locations lovely, and the entertainment has been very well received. If you can tell us why you do not attend luncheons, and what you would like to see changed, please do not hesitate to speak up. We welcome your input.

Bad News: Provincial has raised their portion of your fee from \$40 to \$50. This means that there will still be an increase in our total fees. We will now pay \$65, instead of \$60 for this year. This fee is due by August 1st.





