RWTO-OERO Convention

The 69th Convention took place in Brantford. Patricia L. and Sandie B.were acclaimed to share the position of Second Vice-President.

The financial report was approved with the understanding that there is a significant deficit. Suggestions to reduce costs by sending out Connections digitally rather than through Canada Post were discussed. Many pleas were made to continue a paper copy as many members would not be able to access a digital copy and that is one of the primary methods of maintaining communication with members. This suggestion was referred to an Ad Hoc committee to study.

The resolutions were carried.

#1. Each branch is entitled to eligible delegates according to this formula:

Up to 100 members: 2 delegates, 101-150 members: 3 delegates, 151-200 members: 4 delegates, 201-250 members: 5 delegates, 251-300 members: 6 delegates, 301+ members: 7 delegates passed

- #2. The first delegate from each branch will be referred to as Provincial delegate. All other delegates will be Branch Delegates. Each branch who qualifies to send more than 1 delegate, based on the formula in Resolution 1. This is determined by the number of paid memberships of each branch, not including Life members.
- #3. Changing the wording of the policies and procedures to state the changes in Resolutions 1 and 2
- #4. Changing the wording in the Policies and Procedures document to state the Delegate expenses. One Branch delegate will be reimbursed for the Convention Package Fee (registration and meals) and travel which exceeds 800km. Current funding will remain in place.
- #5 Branch Social membership to include a currently working woman who could possibly join RWTO-OERO upon retirement. This motion was deferred for clarification of terms.
- #6 Changing the term for Constitution for Retired Women Child & Youth Care Workers/Counsellors.
- #7 Social Justice Committee be added as a Provincial Committee with details about the structure and goals of the committee.
- #8 Including discussion of Finance committee preliminary budget at Spring meeting of the Executive for approval by Board of Directors.
- #9 Changes to the Constitution reflecting the duties of the Executive.
- #10 Changes to the Constitution to reflect the duties of the Secretary Treasurer to work with the Finance committee to prepare the budget
- #11 Defining the duties of the Finance Committee
- #12 Defining how the travel expenses will be calculated for mileage claims
- #13 Expanding the duties and responsibilities of Branch Executives to include seeking shared roles.

The 2025-2026 Budget was approved.

Terry K. presented a cheque for \$72,029.78 from Manulife for profit sharing. 351 members joined the Insurance plan during the open enrolment window.

BurlOak received a Tier 1 Barbara Bain award for the increase in our members.

BurlOak received a Feather in Your Cap award Food4Kids program where members pack food for kids in schools who face food insufficiency. *Claudia S.*

Cora Baily Award

Mary R. was a first born in Guelph Ontario. Her siblings were a sister who worked as an OR nurse and a successful businessman and jokester brother. She attended Hamilton Teachers College and began her teaching career in Burlington in 1964, shortly after marrying Hugh Mc. on August 8, 1964. Both of them worked and studied to complete their degree during summers and at night school. Their daughters Wendy and Nancy were born in 1972 and 1975. Mary completed her degree at McMaster in 1982 and quickly began working with York University and Brock University as a Special Ed additional qualification prof. Many of our colleagues learned to meet the needs of exceptional children in Halton schools, both public and separate, as well as many other Boards around the province. Mary's career is a legacy of her commitment to teaching and elevating children and teenagers in Halton who needed individualized attention and support to enable them to achieve their goals and have happy lives. Mary has been a maverick in teaching students and teachers throughout her career. She brought many of those same skills to her role with RWTO-OERO first in Burlington and now in BurlOak branch. Mary first became involved in RW in 2005 as a member. She began knitting hats, mitts, socks for donation to local needy schools. Mary took on the role of Membership in 2012-2013, moving onto the role of Secretary in 2013-2018. In 2018 she became a Vice President and then took on the role of President at one of the most challenging times of our lives during the Covid pandemic. Mary has always been an innovator and the social coordinator of her friends and family so taking that role on for RW came naturally to her. She initiated the Tea Room tours for members and during the pandemic she organized tea in a box and co-ordinated the delivery service to ensure everyone got their box and signed into Zoom so we could enjoy talking to one another and savouring the ambiance of sharing tea. She was also involved in our Lunch, and a Movie events. Mary organized car trunk donations at the Burlington Mall parking lot so we could collect and donate to local charities as we traditionally do for the holidays. Mary began the Knitting group in May 2016 to create dolls for a medical mission. This initiative became Burlington branch's first Feather In Your Cap award. Presently Mary is the chair of the Program committee and thankfully has organized all the lunch themes for this year and created a checklist for members to make sure everyone knows how to plan every aspect of a successful luncheon. Thank you hardly seems adequate to recognize you for all the elements you have been involved with over the years Mary. You are the epitome of caring and sharing and having fun. Thank you for all the work you have done for our members over the years. It is my honour and a privilege to present you with the very first Cora Bailey award From BurlOak branch in honour of your 20 years of membership! What a lucky day for us that was!
