

Medium-Sized Branches

Lanark

The branch supported Big Brothers Big Sisters of Lanark County. BBBS operates two stores called Jewels (in Perth and Smith Falls} where they sell good used clothing, jewelry, footwear, purses, books etc. The Lanark Branch organized several events where their members were able to collect pledges while participating RWTO/OERO golfing, curling, and bowling tournaments. Niagara South

This was done through individual branch memorial services as well as at the branch spring luncheon. Every family of a deceased member received a memorial candle made by branch members. A \$30 donation was sent to the Windsor or Essex Public Library for the purchase of a children's book in memory of each member who died. Accompanying nameplates were provided to attach to the new book before circulation. Over \$1000 was donated over the last five years. The Essex County library wrote: "This is a lasting gift in support of literacy and a lasting memorial to honour a life well lived."
