
2017 CONVENTION

“Tip Toe Through the Tulips---With Me!”

If I knew how to write musical notes on the computer, they would appear with the above title. Who doesn't recognize this song made famous in 1968 by Tiny Tim? Did you know that tulips are the most widely recognized and grown flower around the world? On May 13-15 of this year, myself and a friend, had an opportunity to join the retired teachers bus trip and visit our Nation's Capital. The main reason for me was to drink in the sights and smells, of thousands of brightly coloured, fragrant tulips, by attending the Annual Ottawa Tulip Festival. We visited many other attractions, but for me, this dazzling display was the highlight!

On the first day of the trip to Ottawa, we visited the Diefenbunker. This facility was commissioned by Prime Minister John Diefenbaker. The four story, 300 room, 100,000 square foot, below ground building was built in 1959-61 and was meant to house Canadian leaders during a nuclear attack. It is referred to as Canada's Cold War Museum. Linda Jarvis commented that, "the Diefenbunker Museum was new to me and I thought it was incredible." Dinner was back at the Lord Elgin Hotel in a private room. A few laughs and a getting to know you chat, around the table---was the conclusion of Day One.

The rain persisted on Day Two and began with D'Arcy Magee boarding our bus at the Hotel, as our historical tour guide. He took us to the Parliament Buildings and we tramped through the rain soaked pathways to view the exterior of the buildings. The RCMP- Musical Ride Horse Stables were next and the rain did not let up! Many interesting artifacts were viewed and lots of information was disseminated. Unfortunately, at this time, the horses were absent from the stables. The horses along with their trainers, veterinarian, blacksmith and riders had travelled to England to prepare for the Queen's 90th Birthday Celebration. Despite the absence of the horses, it proved to be one of the most interesting stops along the tour. The RCMP Musical Ride is performed by 32 riders and their horses. The performances consist of intricate figures and drills choreographed to music and raises thousands of dollars for local charities and non-profit organizations.

It continued to rain as we drove by the Prime Minister's and Governor General's residence. We arrived near Rideau Hall, and through the Arboretum where more than 130 peace trees grace the grounds, all donated by the Royal family, famous political leaders and heads of state from around the world. A bronze plaque at the base of each tree lists the name and title of the person who planted it.

The tulips---my favourite--- were next and the rain, thankfully had all but stopped. The variety of groupings were a sight to behold! Every imaginable combination of colours, shapes, and clusters of sizes were evident as we drove along the boulevard. The fresh blooms were 'kissed' with tiny dew drops of water, leftover from the morning rain. Many other tourists, in

addition to our group, were touring the gardens and snapping memories to take home.

Lunch at the ByWard Market was an interesting experience. Beaver tails and poutine were on the menu for some of us. In a short time, we raced through the food booths and vendors stands as we gulped down our lunch, bought a few souvenirs and returned to the bus.

Next was a guided visit at the National Art Gallery. Outside, we were greeted by the "Maman", a bronze, stainless steel, and marble sculpture. It is enormous---, measuring 30 feet high and 33 feet wide. The distinctive building architecture was stunning! When you looked through the unique windows, you saw Parliament Hill and when you looked up you were greeted with a, colourful, circular, ceiling mural. This beautiful ceiling painting by Aboriginal artist, Alex Janvier is titled, "Morning Star".

By dinner time, the sun was shining and we enjoyed a river view dinner at the Canal Ritz after which we ventured to the Tulip Festival Pavilion for a look around.

Day Three took us to the War Museum and the Museum of Human Civilization. Both places were fascinating and relevant to us as proud Canadians. A short time was spent at each Museum with a promise to return at another time. JP or (John Paul), our wonderful bus driver, started up the bus for the last time. A happy albeit tired group, boarded the bus for our return trip to Kennedy Commons and home to our own beds.

Speaking of beds---as I mentioned at the beginning, one of the highlights of the trip for me were the beds upon beds of beautiful, blooming, colourful, 'turban' shaped petals bobbing in the breeze and nodding their wet heads to all the passersby. Having recently returned, I am still awaiting a future opportunity when I can revisit Ottawa and "Tip toe through the tulips", once again!

A highlight for Linda Jarvis was "meeting a couple of ladies I have seen for years at the luncheons, but had never met". For me, it was exciting to return to the May meeting and realize that I knew so many more members---as a result of the trip!

**All of us wish to thank Carol Everitt, organizer of the trip, who made it a truly, pleasant and memorable experience by her thoughtfulness, kindness and efficient organization. Also appreciated was the sharing of trivia related to the trip, prepared by Carol and 'words of wisdom' from Lamoine Mustard, both of which kept everyone entertained.




Insurance Report September 2016

- The Hospital & Home Care Plan fee will remain the same as it has been for the last several years.
- The total revenue presented to RWTO/OERO by Manulife Financial from the Insurance Program Plan for the Year 2015 –2016 was \$63,556.99

RWTO/OERO Insurance Plans

There are 3 Insurance Plans available to new registrants providing that you are an RWTO/OERO member in good standing. Please read about these plans in the RWTO Insurance Plans' brochure.

1. **The Hospital & Home Care Plan - the most popular**
2. Personal Accident Death and Dismemberment Plan
3. Travel Insurance Plan - CanAM Insurance. (1-888-326-3535)

Everyone in Ontario is covered by the Ontario Health Insurance Plan. Most people carry additional health insurance to cover such things as the cost of hospital care and treatment, doctor's visits, eye glasses, dental coverage etc. The RWTO/OERO Hospital and Home Care Insurance Plan supplements your provincial health plan and is different from your extended health care insurance. It provides you with financial assistance for the unexpected costs associated with getting well.

Hospital & Home Care Plan

The RWTO/OERO Health Insurance Plan offers post-hospital home care insurance to help with expenses when you are discharged from hospital following an accident or illness. This is a unique plan, offered only to retired WOMEN teachers and their spouses for a very modest premium. (Member - Monthly \$14.49 or Annual - \$173.88, Spouse - Monthly \$15.57 or Annual - \$186.84) In order to apply for this insurance a retired woman teacher must be a member of the RWTO/OERO organization.

We encourage you and your spouse to enroll in the program. When you apply within one year of your retirement and become a member of RWTO/OERO, your acceptance is guaranteed - there are no medical questions asked of you. Your spouse must always complete a medical questionnaire. (You and your spouse are automatically accepted into The Personal Accidental Death & Dismemberment Plan, regardless of your retirement date). To enroll simply obtain a brochure and application form from me, Marilyn Hodge, at the RWTO luncheon. The brochures will be on the table at every luncheon. Please mail your completed application in the pre-addressed, postage-paid envelope.
